## A MESSAGE FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS

Dear NCJW, GRS Members and Friends,

This past year has been filled with learning, advocacy and friendship. We are fortunate to have the support of such a vibrant and strong Jewish community.

Our Public Affairs Committee will continue its efforts as the issues facing us in this year's election can impact the important work of our organization. Voter rights, reproductive justice, the environment and racial equity are just a few of the critical social issues that affect the lives of women, families and children. Last year, our local programs on poverty and the environment were attended by a broad representation of the community.

Poverty in our community is an ongoing challenge that encompasses housing, race and education. We continue to make our small but meaningful impact through our PAD initiative. Providing women in shelters, transitional housing or on the streets the dignity to have access to tampons, sanitary pads or liners is important to women's self-esteem. In addition, it is through our efforts of contacting your legislators that the luxury tax on these essential products will be removed. Your contributions have helped immensely.

Each year we hold our Hannah G. Solomon and Woman of the Year awards brunch. If you attended, you know that **Gina Horowitz**, our 2016 Woman of the Year, spoke from the heart with passion and conviction. In addition, Larry Marx, the director of The Children's Agenda, spoke sincerely of the need to help the youth in our community. These awards are not frivolous, but meaningful ways to highlight issues important to our work.

A small group of us met at **Vancy Boyar's** home to discuss the current status of voting and voter disenfranchisement. The problems seemed overwhelming, but with a little thought some great ideas surfaced,

including closer work with the League of Women Voters in the high schools and developing a video to help teach new voters what to expect at the polling booth and how to find out what a ballot may look like.

This year we are welcoming four new board members: **Jane Amstey, Nancy Tinnes, Nicole Gantshar, and Stacey Trien.**

Our lives are full and time is precious. We encourage you to participate in any way that fits into your personal life and touches your heart. None of these programs or committees are closed to you. # WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW FOR THE ELECTION

There are two elections coming up, the first being a primary for local and state offices on Sept. 13. Not every jurisdiction will have a primary, but there are a few locally, including the one between Harry Bronson and Rachel Barnhart for the 138<sup>th</sup> Assembly district and also one for the Democratic spot on the ballot for the 133<sup>rd</sup> Assembly District, currently held by Bill Nojay. The deadline to register to vote for a primary was August 19, but only brand new voters could select a party between then and the election and be allowed to vote in that party. Anyone else who wishes to change parties can do so at any time, but it doesn't take effect until after the next general election.

The general election for all offices, including president, Congress and the NY Assembly and Senate will be Nov. 8, and the deadline for registration is Oct. 14.

You can check your voter registration status online at <http://www.monroecounty.gov/etc/voter/>. If you have moved or changed your name, you need to update your registration, which you do by filling out a new application form. Forms are available at the County Board of Elections, at any DMV office, at most public libraries, and at many other social service offices. You can also print one and mail it: <http://www.elections.ny.gov/NYSBOE/download/voting/voteform.pdf>

If you will be away from home on Election Day or are sick or disabled, you can request an absentee ballot. This can be done by mail, by sending in this form: [\[monroecounty.gov/files/boe/AbsenteeApplication.pdf\]\(http://monroecounty.gov/files/boe/AbsenteeApplication.pdf\). In some cases, if you go to the Board of Elections before the election, you will be allowed to vote in person at that time. The deadline to request an absentee ballot is the day before the election, and the ballot must be delivered in person or postmarked by the day of the election.](http://www2.</a></p></div><div data-bbox=)

The League of Women Voters is working in coalition with a large group of other organizations known as the Rochester Voters Alliance to register more voters this summer and fall. They are providing registration opportunities throughout the city at many public events and locations. # CONSIDER COLLEGE MENTORS FOR LIFE

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Consider College, an academic and career mentoring program of the Greater Rochester Section, began in 2006 with three classes of 6<sup>th</sup> graders at School No. 17 in Rochester. The goal of the project was to level the playing field with more affluent students by providing educational, cultural, and social activities for low-income Rochester City School District students so that they might see beyond their limited world view and actually consider going to college. Since then, many students in the program have moved from the district, left Consider College, or have dropped out of school entirely. We now have 21 extraordinary young people who are overcoming all the classic disadvantages of poverty: they attend college, they drop out for a semester, they return, they work, they have children, they leave abusive homes, they get married, they join the armed services. Sometimes, out of the blue, they call to ask for help filling out the hideous Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or just to invite one of the mentors out for lunch.

During the most active years of Consider College, we applied for and received grants from the Daisy Marquis Jones Foundation, the John F. Wegman Foundation, Ames Amzalak Memorial Trust, Farash Foundation, and the Rochester City School District. We used these grants to take students to Geva plays, ballets at Nazareth Arts Center, The Corning Museum of Glass, Garth Fagan Dance performances, a Red Wings game, the Susan B. Anthony House, the Central Library and many other places. We held a

Chanukah party one year that included latkes (made by the mentors), menorah lighting, and Chanukah bingo. We visited virtually every college within 50 miles of Rochester and, year after year, many businesses were generous enough to offer our students the opportunity for a morning of job shadowing.

The NCJW mentors have stuck by our mentees through thick and thin, not so much out of a sense of obligation, but because we have come to love our "babies." We mentors also have grown from being a part of Consider College. We have invited mentees to our homes and ventured into some of the most difficult neighborhoods in Rochester for a close-up look at the realities of our students' lives.

We believe that all the students who are going to graduate from high school have done so and we're no longer focused on helping students get into college, but rather encouraging them to stay in college. Each semester we deposit \$100 in every college student's bookstore account, and each June we have a "family" year-end event. This June we went to Painting with a Twist for a relaxing evening of fun, "fine art" and chit chat.

Our ongoing commitment to provide books for college students is significantly less glamorous than preparing them to enter higher education. Foundations generally do not fund ongoing activities. Our expenses to help underwrite books and gather as a group once a year are \$2,500. The

purpose of our sharing some of our history with you is to request your financial help in keeping Consider College going until all 21 students graduate. Please consider making a donation to Consider College in any amount either now or during your end-of-year giving in November and December.
