PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

NCJW has been doing the work for nearly 125 years in Rochester! We look forward to celebrating this important milestone with all of you on September 15, 2019. After 125 years of programs and services, there is still a lot to do.

Our section is working to improve the lives of women, children and families. We do this through hands-on volunteer work and educational opportunities to help us understand how we can take action to make the world better – locally and beyond. Our scope is big and our reach is wide and diverse.

We helped our neighbors meet basic needs with two projects: PAD and Spread the Love. Our PAD Project (Providing Access and Dignity) supplies pads, panty liners and tampons to girls and women who would not otherwise have them. Through our Spread the Love Project, we distributed socks, hats and gloves (and some Valentine's Day treats) to residents on the Fifth Street Block, near the Public Market.

We also held an educational event about our environment and learned

how we can help make a change for the better right now. There was an opportunity to send letters to our legislators, as well as suggestions of immediate actions that we can take, both individually and together, to help repair the world.

We are lucky to have the Susan B. Anthony House in our own backyard. NCJW members took advantage of this and visited the house together in February. We have come so far, yet there is much more work to be done. To help us continue to move forward, we will hold a Men's Event for Gender Equality at 7:00 p.m., April 11, at Temple B'rith Kodesh. We are excited to offer a program that will inspire men (and women) and give them some tools so they can better support the issue of gender equity in the workplace, in the community and in everyday life.

We are honored to be doing this work. We can't do it alone. We need your help! We need you to advocate with us! We need you to invest in us! We need you participate with us!

LEARNING HOW TO SAVE OUR PLANET

On a balmy January evening, a group of about 70 concerned community members gathered at Temple B'rith Kodesh to hear some bad news and some good news about global warming and climate change. The bad news was pretty dire, but most of us are already aware of the polar ice cap shrinking, the rising of the seas, alarming pollution and asthma rates, the extreme heat, and extreme cold. As I write this, Rochester children are home from school, avoiding frostbite from a wind chill of 23 degrees below zero, and we are all learning about the polar vortex that is now escaping the Arctic due to global warming. At the same time, Australia is suffering from 115-degree temperatures, its hottest summer temperature on record. Of course, different areas of the U.S. have already lived through serious droughts, ferocious forest fires, outsized "1,000year" storms, and dangerous flooding.

All this was reported in detail by our first speaker, Norma Polizzi, an environmental lawyer. Norma attended a 3-day training by Al Gore and his Climate Reality Project and gave us a shortened version of that presentation. Sobering as it was, we are hoping that it will spur the

attendees to action. The website for the Climate Reality Project is listed at the end of this article.

Now for the good news: Global warming is actually REVERSIBLE if we all take the frightening reports to heart and mobilize for action. Our second speaker, Sue Staropoli, acquainted us with the Drawdown project, a report of 100 actions that were meticulously researched by scientists and engineers and which we can tackle now with existing technology. Sue is an active member of the Rochester Alliance of Pachamama, a worldwide organization that has taken on the job of spreading the word about Drawdown globally, nationally and locally. Pachamama runs 2-hour introductory sessions and 4-week training courses where participants can explore what action area might interest them and network with others similarly interested. The schedule for these courses in Rochester, and much more information, can be accessed from the Pachamama website below. I urge everyone to pitch in to start reversing global warming. This effort needs a hands-on approach from all. According to a recent UN report, time is running out. We must work together to

maintain a livable planet for us, our children and our grandchildren.

I want to thank Rabbi Rochelle Tulik for an enlightening introduction to our program, linking it with the recent holiday of Tu B'Shevat and the Torah injunction to care for the earth. Thank you also to our environmental co-sponsors who had representatives present to network with attendees. Links to their websites follow as well. Finally, thank you to my program co-chair, Barbara Grosh, and our dedicated committee members: Debby Kornfeld, Ruth Rappaport-Kristal, Sarah Lobe, Gail Finkelstein. and Jackie Ebner.

It's worth noting that Drawdown solutions 6 and 7 are educating girls around the world and global family planning, both long-held priorities for NCJW. If these two solutions are combined, we have the number one solution with the greatest impact on reversing global warming. Thank you NCJW for helping to save the planet while striving to empower women and girls. ≥

Ellen Smith of No One Left Behind Resettlement of SIVs "her personal mission"

Fleeing the ravages and violence of war, pursued by ISIS or the Taliban, immigrants who have served with the American troops and contractors in Afghanistan or Iraq are designated by the U.S. as special immigrant visa (SIV) refugees. Those who arrive in Rochester are literally embraced by the warmth and protection of Ellen Smith, ONE LEA president of No One Left Behind's (NOLB) Rochester Chapter. Whatever the weather, time of day or night, Ellen is there, at the Rochester International Airport, with her contagious smile and reassuring hug. She is always holding a "WELCOME TO ROCHESTER" sign that has been personalized for every new arrival along with flowers and American flags.

This is all part of Ellen's gracious ritual, assisted by dedicated volunteers and currently settled SIVs. One can only imagine what goes through the minds of these arriving individuals and their families, all of whom have been traveling for days to get here. This is merely the threshold to their new world and only the beginning of what Ellen provides on an ongoing basis.

From the time that a SIV is designated to arrive in Rochester, Ellen begins the complex process of the individual's settlement, learning about each person and tailoring his or her living space to meet specific needs. She takes on the resettlement of each SIV as her

needs. She takes on the resettlement of each SIV as her personal mission. She obtains an apartment, ensures that it is cleaned by her and volunteers, fully furnished, decorated and filled with food. NOLB pays the first month's rent. Ellen coordinates with Catholic Family Center to facilitate the neces-

sary paperwork for green cards, benefits, medical appointments and school enrollment.

Ellen's home is literally Command Central for NOLB Rochester. As NOLB has grown, volunteers have been able to

assist with many of the complexities of resettlement. "Caring Circles" of volunteers for each individual or family have been formed to aid in that process.

Employment is a primary focus. A committee helps assess and place SIVs. Once a job its obtained, an SIV becomes eligible for a modest car through the NOLB "Wheels to Work" program. This allows for successful job stability and access to shopping and services in the community.

As the leader of NOLB, Ellen is the advocate, counselor, mother, cultural advisor and emergency contact. When there is an individual or family crisis, Ellen is there. She is tireless, tenacious and determined. Her ever growing fleet of volunteers feels as much allegiance to her as to the SIVs they serve and support. ≥

2019 WOMAN OF THE YEAR

Marilyn Fain Fenster

Before she joined NCJW 30 years ago, Marilyn Fain Fenster said she "didn't realize there were women like me doing what I wanted to be doing in the world." An NCJW project called Day of Working Mothers drew her in.

"My kids were little and I was managing kids and a job," she said. "We delivered gift packages to other busy working moms to help them feel valued and important."

Marilyn started going to more NCJW events and becoming active. "I wanted to help. I offered to do the bulletin for two years," she said. "It's been close to 30!"

The bulletin, which is mailed to over 300 members several times a year, is a major undertaking. Over time, however, Marilyn and other stalwart volunteers like Donna Cohen and Ronny Frishman have streamlined the process. Donna puts together the outline, Marilyn edits the articles and Ronny proofreads all the drafts. Then Marilyn works with the designer at her husband's printing and promotional products company to lay it out and print it.

"Marilyn has provided years of valuable support for NCJW," incoming president **Jane Amstey** said. "Her talents for writing and editing are invaluable."


A teacher at Harley School, Marilyn has enriched the community immeasurably over the years with both her professional

activities include being a career counselor at area universities and Jewish Family Service and serving as a volunteer coordinator for the Rochester Area Interfaith Hospitality Network (RAIHN). Marilyn is on the Board of Trustees at Temple Sinai and has served on the boards of other non-profits over the years. She teaches kindergarten at Temple Sinai and is most proud of her summer work with Horizons, an enrichment program for low-income vouths.

Because she works behind the scenes, Marilyn has a somewhat low profile with NCJW. But members who know how much she has contributed value her dedication to the organization. "Marilyn is my friend, my sister in spirit and is committed to helping others," said **Donna Cohen**, a past president. "She is not only smart and creative. She cares!"

Marilyn, in turn, enjoys her NCJW friends and colleagues: "We are Jewish women from all walks of life who share common values."

Marilyn's husband, Rémy Fenster, is a self-employed brand manager. They have two grown sons: Jason, 33, is an assistant rabbi at a Reform congregation in Deerfield, Ill., where he lives with his wife Gavi and 1-year-old son, Benjamin; Aaron, 31, lives in Washington, D.C., and is the COO of a not-for-profit that provides affordable housing for people with mental health challenges. ≥
