In this past year, our organization's membership has grown as we celebrated our 125th anniversary. During our fall celebration event, it was so special to have as attendees many women who have 30, 40 and 50+ years' experience with NCJW, GRS! It was wonderful to see how we've changed and grown; we now have multiple generations of people actively engaged in our organization.

From its very beginning, NCJW has been addressing reproductive health and justice. As the organization affirms, "NCJW is committed to creating a world where all people, regardless of race, class, gender, sexuality, ability, or immigration status, have the right to build their families and live their lives with dignity. Our Jewish values teach us that our reproductive freedoms are integrally bound to our religious liberty; we are committed to advancing the goals of reproductive justice so that every person can make their own moral and faith-informed decisions about their body, health, and family."

This year, our section's Public Affairs Committee is focusing on reproductive health, rights and justice. The committee hosted a well-attended summer event with Medical Students For Choice and fostered a letter writing campaign to our elected officials. NCJW, GRS is partnering with Planned Parenthood of Central and Western New York for an informative Take Action Night about the Pro-Truth Campaign. This program is based on an initiative launched by NCJW NY to educate communities throughout the nation about the deceptive tactics of crisis pregnancy centers, or "fake clinics." P.A.D. PROJECT: THE YEAR IN <u>REVIEW</u>

The P.A.D. Project enjoyed a busy 2019. Altogether we held 18 parties and one collection drive. We donated more than 1,850 pad kits (around 30,000 pads) to 30 agencies that serve low-income and homeless women. We participated for the third year in Homeless Connect

Rochester, where we gave menstrual kits and tampons kits to over 200 quests who stopped at our table. They were as happy to have the hand-sewn drawstring bags as they were to have the pads and tampons. We also added socks to our table and the guests were delighted to take a pair or two. We'll do that again next year.

The bags are sewn by NCJW,GRS women as well as by members of the

Genesee Valley Quilt Club and IJQ (Internet Jewish Quilters), who mail us their beautiful bags from places as far flung as California and Pennsylvania.

Women's access to pads has been improving. Last December, Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed a law to provide free pads to New York State prisoners. Also passed was a federal law requiring that women incarcerated in federal prisons receive free pads. Now, both federal and state prisons are required to provide these products to incarcerated women. In November, Ohio passed a no "tampon tax" law, making it the 17th state (plus the District of Columbia) that does not tax menstrual products.

Looking ahead, we have five parties already scheduled for 2020. We welcome your interest in holding a P.A.D. collection or



party. If you already make food donations to a local food pantry, you can add a package or two of pads or tampons, which the food pantry will be happy to give to women who need them.

Special thanks go to team members **Soralee Cook**, **Eleanor Hopke, Nancy LeVant, Ellen Solomon**, and **Mollie Traub**; to Sew Green for donating fabric and ribbon; and to Athleta for donating 50 Athleta bags. ≥



THERE'S STILL TIME TO CHOOSE A PARTY

In 2016, a lot of people who had never registered for a political party wanted to vote for Bernie Sanders in the Democratic primary. That's when New Yorkers discovered how restrictive our laws were on party registration. There were a lot of angry voters who found that they would have had to change their party designation before the general elections in 2015 to vote in primaries in 2016. They were out of luck and without a voice in choosing who would appear on the ballot in November.

Last year, both the NYS Assembly and Senate passed a law to change that, and Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed it. The deadline to select a party for the New York presidential primary on April 28, 2020, is now February 14, 2020. Voters can change parties (or pick a party for the first time) up until that date to make their voices heard in April. ≥
