## WE ARE LISTENING TO YOU, NCJW, GRS

Our members' voices are important. We need your help to guide us with programming and communication so we can provide meaningful engagement and address the most pressing issues of our community. The Greater Rochester Section conducted a membership survey recently to assess our members' needs, interests and satisfaction with our organization's efforts over the past year. Thank you to the 51 members who responded to the survey! This information was shared with the GRS Board of Directors and will be helpful in our section's current and future planning.

When asked what the top priority should be for our section's focus, respondents most frequently noted:

- Reproductive Health, Rights and Justice (67%)
- Environment (43%)
- Voter Engagement (41%)
- Civil Rights (41%)
- Human Needs (37%)

When asked about the Greater Rochester Section's communication with members, we learned that most respondents (56%) like receiving the bulletin online;

34% enjoy getting both an online version and hard copy through the mail. More than half of the respondents (55%) follow us on Facebook, and 39% follow us on Instagram. Those who said they were not our Facebook or Instagram followers indicated they tend not to use those forms of social media. A resounding 98% felt receiving eBlasts was helpful in keeping members engaged with timely, relevant issues and programs, and alerting them to ways they could take action locally, regionally and nationally.

Just about all the respondents (98%) expressed satisfaction with being a member of our organization and having their needs met. Numerous members thanked us for all the work taking place during this pandemic. Many members shared that they would like to be engaged in committee or board work. Please watch for upcoming eBlasts and bulletins that provide information on potential opportunities. We look forward to serving members in the coming year and will use your voices to help guide the efforts of NCJW's Greater Rochester Section.  $\geq$

## THE BEAUTY OF KOL NIDRE

There has always been something special for me about Kol Nidre. As a kid, getting dressed up at night meant a special occasion, like attending an RPO concert or seeing a show at the Auditorium Theater. We attended Friday night services frequently as a family, but they always had a casual feel. Kol Nidre is different. Walking into the Temple Beth El sanctuary at night, wearing my "Saturday best," still gives me butterflies. The air is thick with anticipation. The magnificent stained glass windows, normally streaming with sunlight, are muted and somber at dusk. As the sanctuary fills with people, I see faces I've known for 30 years, faces of people who have borne witness to my life. My family settles into our High Holiday seats (different from our normal seats, naturally) and we pick up the conversations with our neighbors from last year as if no time has passed: questions about the kids, mazel toys on the simchas - the usual. For me, the holiness of the High Holidays is rooted in community. It's the feeling of being enveloped by my fellow Jews that elevates the evening. Last year, not being able to gather together drastically changed my experience of the High Holidays. While I was sad about not being able to participate in this annual ritual of community, I felt a sense of solidarity with my fellow Jews who were experiencing the same unprecedented situation, and who were soldiering on as Jews have been doing for



The Talmud teaches that anyone who sees harm and does not speak out is held responsible. Our vote is our voice, and we must also protest attacks on the rights of other voters. We are obligated to speak up and take action to ensure that every eligible person can cast a vote and have that vote counted.

Here in the United States, citizens aged 18 and older have the right to vote as stipulated in several Constitutional amendments ratified over the years. Despite that, our voting rights are being attacked on every side, at every level and in every state. State laws being enacted may appear unobtrusive, but in fact they disillusion a public already weary of partisan bickering only to be amplified with misinformation on social media.

Last November, with a nationwide effort from many corners of the country, a nonpartisan push to get out the vote did, in fact, rally citizens from all different backgrounds. Our efforts had an impact and will continue to effect change.

NCJW volunteers nationally, and especially in Arizona and Texas, are on the ground

thousands of years. I am hopeful that we can be in person again this year, but I know that new challenges will continue to arise and we will face them the only way we spotlighting the detrimental effects of these new laws. They are our fellow members who need our voices and support in advocating for federal legislation.

After the Supreme Court upheld Arizona's restrictive voting laws, NCJW CEO Sheila Katz wrote, "Today's decision by the Supreme Court . . . will negatively impact voters across the country – particularly those who are already marginalized. By allowing the laws in Arizona to remain in place, the Court has further weakened the Voting Rights Act, and once more demonstrated the need for Congress to take action to pass the For the People Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act."

Stay tuned as we move into the fall with important local elections in November.We will be partnering with the League of Women Voters and other nonpartisan organizations to get out the vote. Every election has consequences and the success of NCJW's mission depends on our votes and efforts.≥
